


BIG PICTURE

Norwich "The City of Stories" is located in East Anglia and is one of the most beautiful modern historic cities in Britain. Until the 17th century, Norwich was the country's second biggest city with its wealth built on trading. This has created a very rich tradition of heritage especially in the city centre, which boasts the largest intact medieval street pattern in Europe. Norwich city centre combines old and new beautifully, whilst still retaining its character and charm.

Norwich offers an outstanding quality of life, fantastic career options and the benefits of living in a vibrant city with easy access.Visitors can enjoy a variety of museums, galleries, cafés, restaurants and other services, many of which are housed in beautiful heritage buildings which feature architecture from the Norman, medieval, Georgian,Victorian and modern eras. Norwich has recently been named as a UK Tech City in a study compiled by the government-backed organisation Tech City UK. The findings of the Tech Nation study revealed that the city and the wider county mounted a 21% growth in new technology companies between 2010 and 2013, with 14,521 people now employed in the digital sector.

In 2014 Norwich Lanes was selected as the winner for the City Category of the Great British High Street Award and received recognition on a local and national level.

Norwich city's population is divided almost equally in gender, with a total population of 134,300. This figure is expected to increase as the Government has prioritised greater Norwich as a major city that will create 35,000 new jobs and 30,000 new residents by 2026.






EMPLOYEES FOR PRIVATE SECTOR




EDUCATION OF THE POPULATION OF NORWICH




EMPLOYEES FOR PUBLIC SECTOR



OFFICE



Norwich has 5,618,700 square feet of commercial office space, and is home to many international and regional businesses providing a high number of jobs in the city centre. Central businesses are easily accessible by bus, car, bike or foot. The availability of office space in Norwich is meeting present demand and rental levels are holding firm as a result of this.

Many big companies are situated in the middle of the city centre where there are new, refurbished office spaces that meet the highest standards through to reasonably priced incubator space or offices by the hour. There are inexpensive smaller unit, incubator and grow on spaces that encourage the revitalisation of employment areas and secondary shopping areas.



INDUSTRIAL RENTAL PRICE





EDUCATION ART AND CULTURE




The City of Norwich benefits from a wide range of arts and cultural organisations; visitors to the city can experience a range of beautiful and historic museums, galleries and gardens within the city centre. Norwich is also home to one of the top 15 Universities in the UK and was rated 3rd for student satisfaction. In 2012 Norwich became England's first UNESCO City of Literature; this accreditation is a well-deserved acknowledgement of Norwich's astounding literary heritage and contemporary strengths.

Norwich has the second highest graduate retention rate in the country; over 40% of graduates stay in the Norwich area, mainly due to the city's career opportunities and the amazing lifestyle offer.









TOURISM AND HOTELS




Norwich city centre offers its visitors and residents beautiful gardens, historic places and diverse shopping areas along with many other wonderful discoveries. The visitor economy is a vital part of the financial makeup of the city and the surrounding region. Of the approximated £410m direct visitor expenditure in the county, 7% was spent in the accommodation sector, 38% on shopping, 34% on food & drink, 11% on attractions and entertainment and II% on travel and transport within the local area. The total value of tourism in Norwich was estimated at £650m supporting an estimated 10,000 tourism related jobs within the district.

DIRECT EMPLOYMENT IN BUSINESSES AND IN RECEIPT OF VISITOR EXPENDITURE (FTES)




RETAIL



Norwich city centre is one of the top 10 shopping destinations in the UK. Norwich is a regional retail centre with a huge diversity and range of shops, from the high end fashion stores in the shopping centres and high street to the boutique, vintage and hipster offers of the award winning Norwich Lanes and Royal Arcade. Norwich city centre has two large shopping centres, intu Chapelfield and Castle Mall, housing a variety of clothing stores, shops, restaurants and more.

Around 54% of the total businesses in the city centre are in the retail sector, which has a high level of investment due to its popularity. Norwich has the largest 6-day open air market in the UK, offering fruit and vegetables, clothes, shoes and much more.


FOOTFALL DAY PART






PEDESTRIAN ACTIVITY BY DAY 2014

RETAIL RENT IN POUND (£)






NORWICH MONTHLY TOTAL FOOTFALLS

HIGH STREET RETAIL DEMAND VS SUPPLY



RESTAURANT, TAKEAWAY AND FOOD SHOPS





Norfolk provides a great source of local produce from its farming, livestock and fishing, which are masterly crafted by the finest chefs in local restaurants.

Eating out in the Norwich city centre provides you with the choice of 485 bars and restaurants, all offering a welcoming space to eat and relax. Restaurants offer local cuisine using fresh, seasonal Norfolk produce as well as dishes using food from further afield including American, Asian and European recipes, plus many more. Many restaurants are independent, family run businesses that offer a warm welcome and a family-friendly dining experience.

RESTAURANTS, TAKEAWAY OR FOOD SHOPS BY HYGIENE RATING





EMPLOYMENT




Norwich has 97,000 workers within the local authority area. The city centre has both public and private sector employees, and provides opportunities for everyone from all levels of education. The number of Norwich-based employees has increased by 1.6% from 2012 to 2013, raising the total number of employees in Norwich area to 129,200. Most of these work for a Small or Medium business enterprise (SME) of 0-249 employees. Norwich showed significant strength in its entrepreneurial and micro businesses, with 57% of the total companies employing 0-4 members of staff.




METHOD OF TRAVEL TO WORK


TOTAL NUMBER OF EMPLOYEES IN NORWICH CITY COUNCIL AREA



TRANSPORT AND ACCESS



Norwich Airport is only a short journey from the city centre, and flights operate direct from here to UK airports and worldwide via Amsterdam with a 17 per cent increase in total passengers' numbers to 465,664 during 2014. The train provides a direct 1 hr 50 minute service into the centre of London, with services operating every thirty minutes at peak times and there are also frequent trains to Cambridge, Ipswich, Liverpool, Manchester and other midlands and northern cities. **Buses from Norwich city centre run** regularly throughout the region, with many operating every 15 minutes, and the excellent Park and Ride service runs from 6 different sites around Norwich.




TOTAL FOOTFALL FOR NORWICH TRAIN STATION




Norwich offers a fine mix of accommodation for all tastes and budgets. There are many properties available within the city centre and, as Norwich is one of the safest cities in the UK, there are many reasons to choose to live or invest here. This has been reflected in an increase in residential prices by 8% since 2012 to 2013 and has a maintained a strong housing market thanks to its excellent quality of life and mix of housing to suit all needs, whether renting or buying.

On average employees earn a competitive salary compared to the cost of living in the city; the average salary for a full time worker is $\pounds 1,800$ per month, further adding to the city's appeal.




